SPRING ASSEMBLY MINUTES

28 APRIL 2019

Area Chair opened the meeting at 10:03 AM with the Serenity Prayer, and a reading from chapter 5 of the service manual.

Quorum call

45 voting members in attendance.

Secretary's Report

Secretary read old and new business from Fall Assembly 2018 and a motion was made to accept the report, seconded and passed unanimously.

Treasurer's Report

This report will capture 6 months activity from the Fall Assembly 2018 to Spring Assembly 2019

Opening balance for Oct. 2018 was \$4,579.52. Contributions for the past six months totaled \$16,028.88. Area expenses totaled \$18,132.43. The closing balance was \$2,407.76 plus Prudent Reserve: \$8,500 = \$10,907.76 Total funds available.

Our contributions have increased compared to the same 6-month period of 2018 (\$13,087.33). Our expenses have decreased from the same 6-month time period of 2017 (\$18,239.64). Given where we are in the calendar year, we will not meet our projected goal (\$30,000) for contributions this year. We continue to educate our fellowship about the importance of the seventh tradition and the service that is being done at the District/Area and GSO levels.

We currently have 303 Active Groups in Area 31, Groups with current and updated contact info and are presumably still meeting, both with and without GSR's

11 unknown groups-groups with invalid contact information either because they are no longer active or have outdated info. This information has been passed onto DCM's for verification purposes- It is the districts responsibility to find and update these groups appropriately. We had 12 in January and now have 11 thanks to district verification.

7, merged group-2 or more groups that has joined to form 1 group

0 new groups

My goal this year is to continue to co-ordinate with Districts and GSRs in keeping the Database known as FNV (Fellowship New Vision) updated. I hope to smooth the transition for our Area as we go live with the new database – ERP (Enterprise resource planning) system that will be called the Customer Relationship Management system-C.R.M. –that is replacing the old FNV we currently us-The GO Live date is currently pushed to an unknown date.

Archivist's Report

During the last weekend of February, it was my privilege to attend NERAASA and represent Area 31 at the Archives Roundtables that met on Friday and Saturday evening. There were Archivist and Archives Chairs from several areas in the Northeast Region. Most of the topics are the same every year.

Topics Discussed:

- Each Area has to decide if it wants to be a just collection or a history of our past.
- Take the value out of your display by making copies.

- Digitizing archival material continues to be ongoing.
- There are guidelines of questions that you might ask when taking an oral history. It is also recommended that the history be written. Paper is still the longest lasting archival material
- Don't forget to make copies.
- It is recommended in the Archives Guidelines that the Archivist not rotate every two years. Most of the Archivists at the roundtable were appointed. Some to be reappointed every 2 or 4 years by the incoming chair. Some have a vote at assemblies and some do not. Experience varies but knowledge of AA in your Area is essential.
- Old documents should not be photo copied. The light will damage the paper. There is a process called contact copying that does not use a light or scanning and will not damage documents.
- Don't forget to make copies.
- The date your group was started can be determined by the group number.
- The date your group registered is probably around the time it started.
- Leave group histories out at assemblies. If there is missing or incorrect information someone will correct it.
- Don't forget to make copies and give one back to the group.

In November I was given an AA Big Book from someone at the MA State Convention. This is the perfect example of something that would be listed as part of a collection.

Last month I was given a Fist Edition/Eleventh Printing of the AA Big Book from a member in Area 31. This is a perfect example of archival material from Area 31. The difference between the second and the eleventh printing is amazing.

Sorting and filing archival material is an ongoing and never-ending challenge.

We have a very enthusiastic Archives Committee and it is a joy to be of service with them.

Good afternoon. I'm currently serving as Chair of the A31 GV/LV Committee since Jan 2019. Honored to participate at this level during the BB's 80th year and the GV's 75th year. We meet monthly for an hour on the first Tuesday of the month at 474 Pleasant St. in Holyoke at 730p. During the last four meetings, we mostly greeted 13-14 new GV Reps and oriented them about their roles and responsibilities in order to serve their groups. The Committee continues to discuss the idea of using the weekly radio show in the context of Tradition 11 – weighing the value of attraction not promotion in order to draw awareness to the Grapevine & La Vina. The idea has also been presented at the March 2019 Area 31 meeting to the PI Chair & Co-Chair. The Area 31 Committee has been doing its work these last 6 months. We set up an ad hoc committee to look at the GSO consolidation issue. Our Committees and Districts have been busy carrying out their responsibilities to help ensure the next sick and suffering alcoholic has a place to go.

We rented a van to bring members to NERAASA and had a comprehensive look at the new bridge over the Hudson. Area 31 had a tremendous showing at NERAASA especially considering the distance. NERAASA is a valuable resource for our growth both in our current service positions and our future positions. I would like to thank the groups for their generous contributions that allow us to assist area servants in this endeavor each year as well as keeping the committees and districts funded for all of their activities.

These past months have also brought about much discussion regarding our assemblies and how the locations are decided. This is our 3rd assembly outside of Holyoke and prior to that Chicopee in the last 15 years or more. We had an opportunity for change created by a fire in the facility in Holyoke last year and we decided to rotate the assemblies throughout the districts. While this is not a requirement, I will be looking to District 6 for the fall assembly. And a big thanks to District 3 for hosting this assembly. They did a great job with enthusiasm and vigor. For informational purposes, the past 2 Mini conferences had attendance of 99 and 102 respectively. Yesterday we had 132 participants and an astounding 51 from the host District 3. I think it is clear that continuing the practice of rotating our assemblies through the districts is something we should embrace.

Area Unity has been a recurring theme in this panel and rotating the assemblies has helped to be sure. We are also discussing the possibility of having a Skype style concept meeting with district 3 more to be revealed on that one.

The concept meeting hosted by the area on the first Thursday of each month is experiencing an increase of participation and is a terrific place to read, share and listen to learn about what the concepts are and how they apply to our service in AA.

The Area also hosts a service manual meeting on the third Wednesday of the month and that could use some support. Both meetings meet at 7:30 PM and are at 474 Pleasant St in Holyoke.

If your group would like to do a group inventory and is looking to contact one of our many past delegates to facilitate it, I can help with connecting them.

Also, if your group would like to have a service commitment brought into your group by the area committee, I would be the contact for that as well.
