Balancing Your Triangle: Recovery, Unity, Service Workshop

AA's First Legacy is Recovery which is embodied in the Big Book, in the Steps, and in person-to-person Twelfth Step Work.

AA's Second Legacy is Unity. This Bill realized when he said, "We can do together what I cannot do alone" - it was vital that AAs stay together. To ensure AA Unity, Bill has written the Twelve Traditions.

AAs Third Legacy is Service. The General Service Conference in the means by which the Fellowship is autonomous, operating through the instrument of a truly democratic, *representational*, elected form of self-government.

As defined by Bill, ". . . an AA service is anything whatever that helps us to reach a fellow sufferer - ranging all the way from the Twelfth Step itself to a phone call and a cup of coffee, and to AA's General Service Office for national and international action.
